### Parrotfeather

*Myriophyllum aquaticum*

#### HOW CAN YOU CONTROL IT:

Priority and Early Detection Rapid Response (EDRR) species should be reported to the Oregon Invasive Species Hotline ([oregoninvasiveshotline.org](http://oregoninvasiveshotline.org)). These species are being actively tracked throughout Washington County and we depend on the public's keen observations to discover new infestations!

#### MECHANICAL:

It is best to wait until the water has dried or dropped before attempting to remove by hand or rake. When hand pulling, remove all stem fragments and as much of the roots as possible. Dispose of all plant materials in a tied plastic bag and throw away in the trash - not the yard debris.

Monitor the infested areas for several years and pull new sprouts.

#### BIOLOGICAL:

Currently, there are no biological control agents for parrotfeather.

#### CHEMICAL:

Check back soon for herbicide information!
